HOMECRAFT - HOW TO ENTER

Please ensure that you have read this schedule thoroughly including the rules and regulations, conditions of entry, closing dates and definitions. Carefully select the classes in which you would like to enter. Please contact administration if you are unsure of definitions

1. ONLINE ENTRIES

Enter online via https://showday.online/show/royalgeelong and follow the links. It is secure, quick and easy. If you are entering online, you are agreeing to the terms & conditions and the entry is accepted as signed.

2. MANUAL ENTRIES

Each exhibitor must have their own entry form which includes all junior and special needs classes. Manual entry forms <u>must</u> be signed by the exhibitor.

Incomplete entry forms will not be processed.

3. ENTRY FEES

You must include payment for your entries in full at the time of entry. Please pay close attention to the entry fees listed at the beginning of each section as they can vary.

All entries (online & manual) will incur a \$5 processing fee.

Arts and Crafts, Cookery and Woolcraft Classes

\$2.50 per entry, limit of 2 entries per person, per class

Special Needs Classes

Free entry, limit of 2 entries per class

4. CLOSING DATES

Entries strictly close on the advertised closing dates. Late entries will not be accepted under any circumstances.



All Victorian Agricultural Show classes (cookery, crafts and photography) are judged at our Show and the winners move on to the South West Regional Finals. Winners of the regional finals progress to the State Finals. The Carrot Cake and Junior Muffins are judged at the annual VAS Convention, all other classes are judged at the Melbourne Royal Show.

SPECIAL PRIZES

Edna McCann Memorial Most Successful Homecraft Exhibitor

\$250 prize donated by the McCann Family

Awarded to the most successful exhibitor across all sections of Open Homecraft. Points System 1st - 5, 2nd - 3, 3rd - 1 point. Points must be achieved across three distinct sections. Excludes Seniors, Special Needs, Woolcraft, Horticulture, Group Work, CWA and Challenge Sections

In 1929, Miss Edna McIntyre started her association with the Geelong Show Society as an attendant to the Carnival Queen. She married, began exhibiting, and joined the Stewards group. Now Edna McCann, she was elected to the position of Superintendent of the Ladies Committee in 1938. She and her team always created interesting displays in the pavilions. Edna's leadership skills and dedication to the Show for more than 50 years is an outstanding record, and the recipient of this Award can be proud to have earned it.

Isla Adamson Champion Craft Exhibit

\$100 prize donated by Mrs Isla Adamson

The Winner is chosen from the Best Exhibits in Art, Craft, Hook & Bobbin, Needlework, Photography, Millinery Senior, Citizens and Woodwork Sections. The Champion Craft Exhibit will be judged based on aesthetic appeal and workmanship.

Isla began exhibiting needlework and cookery as a youngster in 1937 and joined the volunteer Stewards in 1948. Isla maintained her interest and skills in this field and took over the role of President and Convenor of the Home Industries pavilion in 1989. Isla is a wonderful source of support and knowledge to Stewards new to the system. She has served in roles on the Executive, and her distinguished service to the Society was rewarded with an Honorary Life Membership in 2005.

Dulcie Rogers Memorial Most Successful Cooking Exhibitor

\$100 prize sponsored by the Hellebrand Family

To qualify exhibitors must secure points in both Cookery and Jams and Preserves. Points awarded to one entry per class per exhibitor. Points System 1st - 5, 2nd - 3, 3rd - 1 point.

Dulcie was raised on a farm, and from an early age, grew vegetables, milked a cow, and cooked for her family. The Geelong Show was a popular annual event for them, and after Dulcie married, she lived in St. Helens, from where she and her three small children walked to the East Geelong Showgrounds every year. Her passion was cooking – jams, preserves and superb sponges and scones. When her vision deteriorated in later years, Dulcie took up pottery, entering items for Vision Australia. Assisted by family, Dulcie continued to visit the Show Homecraft Pavilion until her passing, aged 91 years.

Peg Bone Memorial Horticulture Aggregate

\$200 prize money and trophy sponsored by her Family

Awarded to the overall aggregate winner of the Horticulture Section. Points awarded to one entry per class per exhibitor. Points System 1st - 5, 2nd - 3, 3rd - 1 point on open and novice classes.

.In 1962, Peg Bone's love of plants led to her start exhibiting in the Flower section of the Geelong Show. This association led to Peg being elected to the role of Convenor of the Floral pavilion in 1987, and she established Horticultural courses in the Hall of Agriculture. Peg became a Life Member and a Councillor of the Royal Geelong Agricultural and Pastoral Society.

The President and the Committee of the Homecraft Section would like to thank these fine ladies and their families for their generous donations, their pioneering spirit, and the wonderful legacies they have left for us to follow.

HOMECRAFT REGULATIONS

- 1. All entries must be the bona-fide work of the Exhibitor.
- 2. All exhibitors MUST be AMATEUR
- 3. Exhibits are not to be advertised 'FOR SALE'.
- 4. All Exhibits for judging must have been completed since the 2022 Show.
- 5. Entry fees will not be refunded.
- 6. An Exhibit cannot be entered in more than one class.
- Exhibits may be personally delivered, forwarded by post or by courier to the Geelong Showgrounds. Exhibits lodged after stated times, may be accepted but will not be judged.
- 8. Laundered and/or worn articles are not eligible for entry.
- 9. Section tickets must be firmly attached by safety pins or sewn where possible. No dressmaker's pins.
- 10. Points for aggregates 1st 5 pts, 2nd 3 pts, 3rd 1pt.
- 11. All Homecraft and Horticulture classes have an entry limit of two (2) entries per exhibitor.

HOMECRAFT JUDGING

- No Exhibitor or spectator will be permitted in the Judging areas.
- Stewards reserve the right to put wrongly entered articles into correct classes.
- Stewards will divide classes into categories before judging if required.
- 15. No Steward will be allowed to steward in a section if they have Exhibit(s) in that section.

DEFINITIONS

- A Garment A garment is an article that can be fitted onto the body.
- 17. **An Article** A Garment may be exhibited in a class calling for an article, but only garments can be exhibited in garment classes.
- Novice Class Entries by persons who have not previously won First Prize in that class at the Royal Geelong Show.

VAS LTD COMPETITIONS REGULATIONS



THESE REGULATIONS COVER THE VAS LTD EMBROIDERY, CROCHET, PATCHWORK, KNITTING, CROSS STITCH, PHOTOGRAPHY AND SEWING CLASSES

Each exhibit entered must be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor.

- Professionals are not eligible, which is defined as someone that works professionally or derives the greater percentage of their income in that craft, art form or technique.
- 21. All work is to have been completed in the last twelve (12) months prior to its entry at a local Show.
- 22. An Exhibitor may represent only one Society at Group Level and one Group at State Level.
- 23. An Exhibit may only win one Group Final in a Show Season, should the same article be entered again and found to have already won a Group Final in the same Show season the Exhibitor must return the prizemoney and will be disqualified from exhibiting for 12 months.
- 24. The South Western Group winner of the current Show Season will compete as a finalist in the State Final at the 2023 Royal Melbourne Show.
- An Item having won a State Final is no longer eligible to compete in the competition.
- 26. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final level then the second placegetter may be eligible to compete.

VAS LTD COOKERY & JUNIOR COOKERY CLASSES

- 27. The entrant must follow the recipe specifications provided.
- 28. Each cake entered must be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor.
- 29. VAS cookery competitions follow the three levels of competition: Show Level, Group Level and State Level.
- An Exhibitor having won at their Local Show will bake another cake for entry in the Group Final, the winner will then be required to bake a further cake for the State Final.
- An Exhibitor having won at Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show until after the Group Final judging.
- An Exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final.
- If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final Level then the second placegetter is eligible to compete.

GENERAL RGAPS RULES

ENTRIES

- All Exhibits must be the bona fide property of the Exhibitor at the close of entries.
- 2. All entries must be lodged on the Official Entry Form or online, on or before the nominated closing date.
- All entry fees as specified in Schedule must be paid at time of entry.
- 4. Exhibitors must give such information regarding their Exhibits as RGAPS may require and submit Statutory Declarations with such information and produce evidence if called upon by RGAPS. In case of non-compliance, the Exhibit may be disgualified and the prize withheld.

- RGAPS has the right to refuse any entry, refuse any Exhibit entered, the right to compete without giving any reason for same, provided the entrance money is returned.
- 6. Entry fees for withdrawn exhibits will not be refunded.

JUDGING

- Exhibitors will be required to place Exhibits as directed by the Chief Stewards.
- 8. The decision of the Judge as to the merits of Exhibits shall be final and without appeal.
- Where Special prizes are offered in a Class, the First prize offered by RGAPS will be withdrawn unless otherwise specified.
- RGAPS reserves the right to allot a trophy in place of prize money or vice-versa.
- 11. The Judges' may withhold a prize or award a lesser prize.
- 12. The Judges' decision is final.
- 13. RGAPS will not be held responsible in cases where wrong Class tickets have been given to Exhibitors after judging has commenced. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to check section tickets with the Schedule prior to the Show.
- The Committee/Stewards reserve the right to modify classes according to the number of entries received.
- 15. Protests based on non-compliance with the conditions of the Prize Schedule or the Regulations will be taken into consideration by RGAPS, if, lodged with the Chief Steward one hour after the Judge has made their award or for Classes where a prize is not awarded by 3.00 pm on the day of competition together with \$50 as a guarantee of the bona fide of the protest. The money will be returned if the protest is upheld. RGAPS decision will be final and without further appeal, excluding the dog section, which is affiliated with and controlled by the Rules of Dogs Victoria.

PRIZES

- Perpetual Trophies will remain in the Administration Building, Geelong Showgrounds.
- If, due to unforeseen circumstances sponsorship is not forthcoming for any sponsored class, the prizemoney/prize may not be provided by RGAPS.
- 18. RGAPS reserves the right to use photographs and videos of entries at any time, present or in the future.
- Prizemoney is GST inclusive. If you are registered for GST, the onus is on the Exhibitor to remit GST to the ATO and provide RGAPS with a Tax Invoice.
- Any prize (trophy, voucher, etc.) awarded by RGAPS at any of their competitions and left unclaimed for a period of six months, will be forfeited and cancelled by the RGAPS Management Council.
- Any prizemoney cheques not presented within twelve (12) months from the date of the Show will be cancelled by the RGAPS Management Council.

- 22. Any infringement of these Regulations may disqualify the Exhibitor from taking a prize. Any dispute as to the construction of these Regulations or the interpretation of the Schedule shall be determined by RGAPS, whose decision is final and without appeal.
- Results will be posted on the Royal Geelong Show website after completion of the show.

ACCESS

- 24. For entry outside of show hours appropriate vehicle passes must be attached to the windscreen of the vehicle, otherwise entry will be refused.
- 25. Gate instructions must be strictly adhered to.
- 26. No vehicle is permitted entry after 9.00am.
- 27. No Exhibit will be admitted onto the Showgrounds, unless Exhibitor Pass is presented at the gate.
- Security and Show gate personnel have the right to enforce all Regulations regarding gate access to the Geelong Showgrounds
- Implements, machinery and commercial exhibits, livestock and general exhibits must be in their designated areas within the Showgrounds by 8.00am on each morning of the Show.

ANIMALS

- No animals, implements etc. except those entered, will be allowed on the Showgrounds.
- 31. Exhibitors must state as accurately as possible, at time of entry, the date of birth of all stock in classes where age is specified, and in all sheep classes, the time of last shearing.
- 32. Dogs must be registered under the Regulations adopted by Dogs Victoria.
- Water will be provided for stock exhibited, but Exhibitors must provide their own fodder.
- 34. All vehicles bringing livestock Exhibits to the yards must be removed from the Showgrounds after discharging their loads or placed where directed by the Stewards of the Section.
- Primary Producers who show their animals are required to have Public Liability Insurance.
- 36. If, in the opinion of RGAPS any exhibition of livestock is unsound, either temporary or otherwise, the opinion of a Veterinary Surgeon of RGAPS may be obtained at cost of the exhibitor.
- 37. It is the owner's responsibility to provide security to ensure that their animals are kept safe and secure for the duration of their time at the Geelong Showgrounds.

PROPERTY & BEHAVIOUR

38. RGAPS shall not under any circumstances be responsible for any loss or damage of exhibits or displays, all exhibits and displays are accepted solely at the exhibitor's own risk. RGAPS will not be responsible for Exhibits, but every reasonable care will be taken of the same.

- 39. The Royal Geelong Agricultural & Pastoral Society will not be held liable for any injuries that may be suffered by a person or persons taking part on behalf of an Exhibitor. In the event of an incident, RGAPS will appoint attendants to take charge and control all of his/her entries.
- 40. All Exhibitors have a Duty of Care to avoid situations that could lead to injury to themselves or other people. This Duty of Care extends to the prevention of damage to property.
- 41. No Exhibitor shall interfere with the Exhibits in ANY WAY whatsoever during the time the Exhibition is open. Anyone interfering without the permission of the Stewards may be expelled from the Showgrounds.
- 42. No person will be permitted to put any placard or advertisement on pens or grounds without the permission of the President. Proprietorship remains that of RGAPS.
- 43. If, in the opinion of the Stewards, the conduct of any Exhibitor or any other person shall be such as to demand such a course, they shall have the power to forfeit any or all prizes such Exhibitors may have won, and may further cause such person or Exhibitor and Exhibit to be removed from the Showgrounds.
- 44. Exhibitors must comply with any reasonable request of RGAPS representatives.
- 45. All areas must be kept clean and tidy with clearly defined and available access and exit routes always. Build-up of combustible waste must be avoided always.

SAFFTY

- 46. Care must be taken to minimize trip hazards and obstacles that people may walk into. Avoid laying unprotected cables or pipes on or above paths, walkways or roads.
- 47. Exhibitors must notify the Section/Pavilion Supervisor or Administration immediately of any hazards detected or incidents. Hazards or incidents are any situation that could result or has resulted in:
 - a. the injury, illness or death of any person or animal.
 - the damage, destruction or loss of property.
- 48. Emergency information and maps showing Emergency Assembly Points are in the various animal pavilions and buildings. Exhibitors should be familiar with these plans.
- 49. Exhibitors should supply their own Safety Switch (RCD) for installation at each power outlet they use.
- 50. Extension cords must be earthed and all electrical appliances must be earthed or double insulated. Appliances must be in a sound working order.
- 51. The use of double adapters is strictly prohibited. Power boards must be fitted with current overload protection.
- 52. Beverages/Food brought onto the Showgrounds in glass containers is strictly forbidden.
- 53. Radiant electric or gas heaters are prohibited.
- 54. Light sockets must not be used for any other purpose than for lighting.
- 55. No naked flames are permitted.

- 56. Firefighting and other Emergency Equipment must not be removed or used for any other purpose. Missing or unserviceable equipment should be reported to Section/Pavilion Supervisor or Administration immediately.
- 57. All Exhibitor electrical items, including leads, must have a current safety compliance tag.

HOUSEKEEPING

- 58. Smoking is not permitted inside buildings, within 10m of a building entrance, near food sales and eating areas, combustibles, during public performances or while handling hazardous materials.
- 59. Alcohol is not permitted to be brought onto the Geelong Showgrounds.
- 60. Security and Show personnel have the right to enforce all Regulations and control regarding people's behaviour and remove those persons as determined.
- 61. All waste, including liquids, must be disposed of responsibly. Storm drains must not be used for the disposal of waste.
- 62. Media comment about matters involving RGAPS or the Showgrounds is co-ordinated by the President.

125ml milk

125g self raising flour

2 x 60g eggs

pinch salt

½ teaspoon vanilla essence

Method: Grease a tin and line with paper. Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl, make a well in the centre, add milk and lightly beaten eggs. Melt butter and pour into mixture then beat well for three minutes until smooth. Pour mixture into prepared loaf tin, place in oven and bake for 35-40 minutes in moderate oven (180°c). When cold decorate with chocolate icing.

ORANGE CAKE

185g butter, melted

1 large orange

1 cup castor sugar

1 ½ cups self raising flour

3 eggs

Method: Chop and puree the whole orange in a food processor. Add butter, eggs, sugar and flour and mix well. Pour mixture into a greased and lined 18cm cake pan. Bake in a moderate oven 180°C for 50 minutes or until cooked.



PLAIN SPONGE

- 250g sultanas
- 250g chopped raisins
- 250g currants
- 125g chopped mixed peel
- 90g chopped red glace cherries
- 90g chopped blanched almonds
- 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
- 250g plain flour
- 60g self-raising flour
- 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 250g butter
- 250g soft brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
- 1/2 teaspoon almond essence
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs

Method

- Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight
- Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating

- well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon
- Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.
- Cake must be presented on a rigid board with cleats. (Tip - hot glue milk bottle tops to the bottom of the cake board).

Tips for exhibitors

- To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size, it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4 or 6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3 or 4 pieces

Method: Preheat oven to 180°c. Cream butter and both sugars together. Combine remaining ingredients. Roll into balls and flatten on baking tray. Bake for 10 minutes and cool on wire rack.

CARAMEL CRUNCH SLICE

180g butter
125g chocolate
½ cup castor sugar
190g milk arrowroot biscuits
125g walnut pieces
½ can condensed milk
1 tablespoon golden syrup
30g copha

Method: Line an 18cm x 26cm slice tin with baking paper. Break biscuits and walnuts into small pieces, place in a bowl and set aside. Place condensed milk, sugar, golden syrup and butter in a saucepan and stir over low heat until butter has melted. Increase heat and bring to boil stirring continuously until golden brown (approx. 6-7 minutes). Pour over biscuit and walnut mix and stir until combined. Pour mixture into the tin and press out as evenly as possible. Place in fridge. Melt together the chocolate and copha in a saucepan over low heat and pour over the slice. Place back in the fridge to set. Bring back to room temperature to cut the slice.
